A medal was awarded to the soldiers who fought during WW2. A medal is a symbol of great pride and its design was highly symbolical.

Design and create a medal of Victory for the soldiers that fought during WW2. There is a design sheet for ideas and pictures of how to create your medal on the attached pages.

Even after the war, the UK still had rationed food and were being told to grow their own food. The government put out lots of information about this during the harsh rationing time.

Design a poster for the 'Dig for Victory' campaign. Remember to include the key messages of the campaign. Here is an example but there are lots more online.

This year is the 75th anniversary of VE day and it is going to be celebrated slightly differently. You can still celebrate at home by having a stay at home street party or picnic.

VE day was a time to celebrate and people did this through having street parties. People decorated the streets with lots of colour and Union Jack bunting.

Imagine you have a friend visiting England from abroad during the VE day celebrations. They ask you all about the day and want to learn about it.

Create an information booklet or poster about VE day for them.

Remember to include why we celebrate, how people celebrated on the day, how we celebrate now and lots of pictures.

Food was quite different during WW2 and for the celebrations as most food was rationed. This meant people had to adapt their ways of cooking and eating. Here are some recipes that were used during the war and for the VE day celebration parties.


Design and create a medal of Victory template and ideas:

Your task is to create a medal for British soldiers who served in the Second World War that is just as symbolic and creative.


Your medal can be any shape or size but you must have considered the metal and ribbon choices.
